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
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Chairman's Statement



Kate Bolsover - I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report of Fidelity Asian Values PLC (the "Company") for the year ended 31 July 2018.

Fidelity Asian Values PLC provides shareholders with a differentiated equity exposure to Asian Markets. Asia is the world's fastest-growing economic region and the Trust looks to capitalise on this by finding strong businesses, run by trusted people and buying them at a sensible price. The Company, therefore, favours undervalued small and medium sized companies as this allows it to find mispriced businesses, the "winners of tomorrow", before they become well known.

Investment Review

Over the last twelve months, the Company's undiluted net asset value ("NAV") rose by 2.2%. This can be compared to a rise in the Comparative Index of 5.7% (all performance data is on a total return basis). Whilst this underperformance is understandable in the current market environment given Nitin's value based investment approach, it is nonetheless disappointing for shareholders. However, a strong narrowing of the discount from 7.0% to 1.8% has meant that the Company's share price rose by 8.2% over the same period. It is also pleasing that the Company's NAV and share price returns were positive at a time when the overall market environment became more challenging for equities.

Economic and Market Review

In the year under review, equities in Asia Pacific ex Japan generated a positive mid-single digit return in Sterling terms. Lately however, markets in the region have become more volatile because of growing global trade tensions and due to a continued pull-back in China's economic stimulus. The good news is that there were pockets of opportunity and markets experienced a narrow rally.

South Korean equities advanced on the back of political cooperation between the country and China to normalise strained relations. Investor confidence also strengthened amid easing tensions, as historical summits between South Korea, the US and North Korea bolstered hopes for denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula. The Australian market rose, aided by energy, materials and consumer staple stocks. Additionally, the information technology ("IT") sector was the best performing over the year. In India, optimism around progress on key reforms, improving earnings expectations and a rebound in GDP growth in the six months to December supported sentiment. In a noteworthy development, the government announced a recapitalisation programme for state-owned banks to support credit growth in the economy. Sentiment towards Thai equities also received a boost when the military government announced plans to hold general elections in November 2018 to restore democracy. All sectors in the region except industrials and telecommunications ended in positive territory.

Nitin Bajaj, the Portfolio Manager, will give a fuller explanation of the portfolio and its performance in his Portfolio Manager's Review.



Due Diligence visit to Asia

The Board carried out its bi-annual due diligence visit to Asia in January this year, visiting Hong Kong, Shenzhen, Dongguan and Singapore.

Specifically, in Dongguan we met with and undertook a factory tour of Stella International Holdings Limited, a company that develops, manufactures, retails and distributes footwear products and leather goods. While in Singapore we met with senior management of Ascendas India Trust, a property company which owns seven IT parks and is well positioned to capitalise on the fast growing IT and business process management industries in India.

In addition to meeting economists and commentators who provided a macro view of the region, we spent time with Fidelity's investment, research and oversight teams which helped us to gather "on the ground" information at the portfolio level. Together with Nitin and the relevant Fidelity research analyst, we met with eight companies. This allowed us to watch Nitin and the analysts in action as they discussed and challenged management teams. The depth and quality of research provided by Fidelity is amongst the best in Asia and is undertaken by 57 analysts and 32 portfolio managers. Nitin draws extensively on this pool of talent in making his investment decisions and we remain convinced that this is one of the key points of distinction for your Company.

We were greatly encouraged by what we saw throughout a busy few days and came away with a reinforced view that Asia remains a global economic powerhouse, whose developing countries play an increasing role in the consumption of goods as well as their production. With such a large investible universe in Asia, we remain confident that Fidelity's extensive research capability and Nitin's stock-picking abilities will continue to be put to excellent use in the future.

Gearina

As mentioned above, a narrow rally in the market created stock-picking opportunities and Nitin has been able to top up existing positions and add new ones at more attractive valuations. As a result, the Company's net market exposure has increased from 86.8% (31 July 2017) to 89.6% as at 31 July 2018. Nitin has not felt the need to use gearing extensively during his tenure as the Company's Portfolio Manager. He continues to believe that performance will be driven by stock picking and would only use gearing more significantly in an environment he felt was more opportune.

Currency Hedging

Nitin undertook a currency hedge in May 2018. He had seen a number of opportunities to invest in Philippine equities but had some concerns with the Peso exposure that any such investment might involve. He is not making a speculative decision on the future direction of the currency but rather is seeking to remove some of the currency risk, allowing him the freedom to buy the individual stocks that he finds attractive in the Philippines.

It remains the Company's policy not to hedge currency risk against its own base currency (Sterling); therefore any foreign exchange trade will be pegged against either the US Dollar or another Asian Pacific currency.









Chairman's Statement continued

Outlook

Asia remains the most dynamic region in the global economy. So, while a value based approach to investing is currently out of favour, we continue to believe that the long term potential to find good companies to invest in remains intact. The region will present stronger growth opportunities than those available elsewhere in the world due to robust domestic demand and an expanding middle class. It is also possible that potential changes in the monetary policy stance of major central banks and geopolitical tensions could lead to market volatility, which would provide Nitin with an opportunity to make further investments.

OTHER MATTERS

Rrevit

Given the focus on Brexit, it would be remiss not to include a brief statement in this regard. The Board is mindful of the uncertainty caused by Brexit and continues to monitor any impact, along with the Manager, on the Company.

Management Fee

As reported in the Half-Yearly Report for the six months ended 31 January 2018, the Board has agreed a new variable fee arrangement with FIL Investment Services (UK) Limited, the Company's Alternative Investment Fund Manager (the "Manager"). The new arrangement has replaced the Company's annual tiered fee structure of 0.90% on gross assets up to £200 million and 0.85% on gross assets over £200 million. The new fee reduces the headline annual base management fee from 0.90% on gross assets to 0.70% of net assets per annum plus α +/- 0.20% variation based on the Company's NAV per share performance relative to the Company's Comparative Index. The maximum fee that the Company will pay is 0.90% of net assets, but if the Company underperforms against the Comparative Index, then the overall fee could fall as low as 0.50% of net assets.

The new fee arrangement has been effective since 1 August 2018 and provides an overall reduction from the current management fee structure. Full details of the new fee calculation are set out in the Directors' Report on page 27.

There will be no change in the investment process as a result of the new fee arrangement.

EU Product Regulation

The European Union's Packaged Retail and Insurance-based Investment Products (PRIIPs) regulation, which came into force on 1 January 2018, is aimed at helping retail investors better understand and compare the key features, risks, rewards and costs of different products through a short Key Information Document ("KID"). While the Board welcomes transparency and the spirit in which this regulation was intended, it should be noted that the content of the KID, including methodologies for the calculation and presentation of risks, performance scenarios and costs is laid down by regulation, and does not necessarily reflect the views of the Board.

The forward-looking Performance Scenarios are based on degrees of variation from historic performance, and in our view, are potentially misleading and certainly cannot be guaranteed. The figures in the KID may not reflect the expected returns for the Company and are likely to be higher following periods of strong returns and lower following market falls. It should always be remembered that past performance is not a guide to future performance.

Authority to Allot Shares

As the Company's shares had, at times throughout the previous year, traded close to premium, the Directors sought and received shareholder approval at last year's Annual General Meeting ("AGM") to increase the authority to issue shares from 5% to 10% of the issued ordinary share capital of the Company, without first offering such shares to existing ordinary shareholders pro rata to their existing holdings. This authority expires at this year's AGM on 13 December 2018 and the Directors are seeking to renew this authority at the forthcoming AGM.

Bonus Issue of Subscription Shares

Following approval of the bonus issue of subscription shares at the Company's AGM on 2 December 2016 on the basis of one subscription share for every five ordinary shares held by qualifying investors, 1,181,189 ordinary shares of 25 pence were issued on 30 November 2017. This was the first subscription date of the conversion rights attached to the subscription shares. As at the date of this Annual Report, there are 12,316,033 subscription shares remaining and these can be exercised in the 25 business days preceding the last business day in November this year and also in November 2019. The exercise price is equal to the published NAV of 366.88 pence per ordinary share on 2 December 2016 plus a premium of 4% if exercised this year (381.75 pence) and a premium of 7% if exercised in 2019 (392.75 pence).

Share Repurchases and Treasury Shares

No ordinary shares were repurchased for cancellation or for holding in Treasury and no subscription shares were repurchased for cancellation during the year under review and none have been repurchased since the end of the reporting period and as at the date of this report.

Dividend

Subject to shareholders' approval at the forthcoming AGM, the Directors recommend a dividend of 5.50 pence per ordinary share which represents an increase of 10.0% to the 5.00 pence paid in 2017. This dividend will be payable on 17 December 2018 to shareholders on the register at close of business on 12 October 2018 (ex-dividend date 11 October 2018). As the Company's objective is long term capital growth, any revenue surplus is a function of a particular year's business and it should not be assumed that dividends will continue to be paid in the future.

Board of Directors

All Directors are subject to annual re-election at the forthcoming AGM and their biographical details are on page 26 to assist shareholders when considering their votes.



Annual General Meeting

The AGM of the Company will be held at 1.30 pm on 13 December 2018 at Fidelity's offices at **25 Cannon Street, London EC4M 5TA** (nearest tube stations are St Paul's or Mansion House). Full details of the meeting are given on pages 69 to 71.

This is our opportunity to meet as many shareholders as possible and I hope therefore that you are able to join us. In addition to the formal business of the meeting, Nitin will be making a presentation on the year's results and the prospects for the Company for the year to come.










Portfolio Manager's Review



"All my decisions in the Company are made at the stocklevel - one business at a time. Clearly these will aggregate up to a certain country or sector weighting, but every decision I make is based on the merits of an individual business and I would caution you not to read too much into country and sector weightings."

Nitin Bajaj has been the Company's Portfolio Manager since 1 April 2015. He is based in Singapore and has over 18 years' investment experience and is also the Portfolio Manager for the Fidelity Asian Smaller Companies Fund. Nitin joined Fidelity in 2003 as an Investment Analyst in London. He moved to India in 2009 to take over the Fidelity India Special Situation Fund and subsequently started the Fidelity India Value Fund. Nitin managed these funds until November 2012, when Fidelity decided to sell its India business. Nitin holds a Bachelor of Commerce from the University of Delhi, India and an MBA from INSEAD. He is also a Chartered Accountant.

Question

What has the market environment been like in the year under review?

Over the last 12 months, the Asian equities market returned around 8% relative to a long term average of 7-10%. In this sense, it has been a relatively unexceptional year.

What is striking, however, is the degree to which the performance of different investment styles has diverged. Momentum stocks (primarily technology companies) enjoyed an excellent run in 2017 and early 2018. Such fashions dominate markets from time-to-time before fading away. I think we may have witnessed a period like this - good businesses trading at unrealistic and often risky valuations.

Question

What have been the main contributions to performance?

Performance over the last couple of years has been solid rather than spectacular. As per the first table on page 7, my three-year tenure numbers are stronger.

Last year I explained the relative underperformance of the Company to shareholders, which was the result of not owning large technology companies and debt driven cyclical businesses in China. As it turned out, these stocks delivered excellent returns but I simply couldn't see sufficient margin of safety to warrant an investment.

This reporting year the narrative has been similar - but it has been a year of two halves, as per the second table on page 7.

Up until January 2018, technology stocks remained in vogue, but since then some of the risks inherent in their business models have attracted greater scrutiny and markets have pulled-backed quite firmly. We have weathered this storm well.

If we look at stock-specific impacts on performance there are a few things to highlight.



We had three situations where companies we owned were acquired at a significant premium (more than 50% on average) – Programme Maintenance Services, Lifecarehealth Group and Zhaopin. All of these represent first-rate businesses, generating significant amounts of cash, in niche areas and had not caught the eye of the wider market. Looking for these sorts of situations is integral to my process.

We also enjoyed significant success with Tianneng Power, Dream International and Texhong Textiles (with all three stocks returning in excess of 50%). These are excellent examples of small

companies with talented management teams continuously driving their businesses forward, while generating attractive returns on capital. Finding hidden gems such as these is exciting and consumes most of my team's time, as well as that of the small-cap analyst team at Fidelity.

Less encouragingly I made two basic mistakes, both of which, with hindsight, were avoidable. While I bought G8 Education and Redington India Ltd at attractive prices, I failed to sell them when valuations began to reflect optimistic business conditions (both were up nearly 70% from where I bought them). Lesson learnt.

Question

Have there been any major changes to your strategy?

Answer

No, there has been no change in my investment process. The financial returns that the Company will be able to generate over the coming five years will largely be driven by the hard work of the team and the consistency of application of our investment philosophy. My process has been built over years of practice, observation and empirical evidence. I do not feel the need to change something that works for me.

In essence what we are trying to do is buy good businesses run by good management teams and to buy them at prices that make sense. To accomplish this, my main areas of focus have always been:

• The business

Understanding the business – the key drivers, the industry structure and its history. Unless the industry structure changes, the past will be indicative of what we can expect of the business in the future.

Looking through the financials of the last 10-20 years to understand the historic return on capital and cyclicality.

Gauging the management team on skill and integrity. I only want to invest with honest and trusted management teams.

Being aware of tailwinds or headwinds that a business or an industry may have had in the last 10-15 years, which may distort what the business was able to deliver in that period.

Looking for businesses with economic advantages, histories of decent profitability (even though cyclical) and margins below historic levels. These factors contribute to a business being able to survive turbulent times.



Portfolio Manager's Review continued

Valuation

The entry price is key as it determines both the base for compounding capital return as well as providing a margin of safety. I look for valuation anomalies or opportunities to buy a good business at attractive valuations. These are situations where in my opinion the market either ignores or misunderstands certain aspects of the business. I would very rarely buy good businesses when valuations are high because it gives me very little margin of safety. For me investing is as much about protecting the downside as it is about participating in the upside.

Downside protection

The key thing is to avoid big mistakes. In my experience, big losses arise from the following situations:

- Blue sky: Untested business models (new technology) or high expectations from a tough business (life insurance, for instance)
- High financial leverage

- Turnaround of a bad business at fair valuation (reputation of management versus reputation of the business)
- High growth companies with low barriers to entry
- Well-discovered stories where the business is still doing well - momentum stocks spring to mind.


Question

What have been the major changes to the portfolio over the period?

Answer

All my decisions in the Company are made at the stock-level – one business at a time. Clearly these will aggregate up to a certain country or sector weighting, but every decision I make is based on the merits of an individual business and I would caution you not to read too much into country and sector weightings.

In terms of positions to highlight, I would mention that I have taken a substantial position in the Indian mortgage space with around 5% of the Trust spread across three different companies – Housing Development Finance Corporation, Indiabulls Housing Finance and LIC Housing Finance.

All of these stocks exhibit the traits I look for:

- Each has a significant competitive advantage based on lowcost operations and low borrowing costs;
- They have prudent and trusted management teams which have kept both operating costs as well as non-performing loans in check for long periods of time;
- A growing market India has less than 10% mortgage/GDP ratio. Comparable ratios in UK are at 60%. These companies can continue to grow for the next decade and beyond.
 The key will be backing the right management teams who execute in this growing market without taking undue risks.
- Finally, they are available at quite attractive valuations. They
 easily meet my criteria of having 50% upside over 3 years
 with limited risks.

Question

To what extent would a stronger dollar affect global growth and the emerging markets? How concerned should investors be about the impact of heightened political risk on trade and growth?

Answer

It is certainly fair to say that political risks have intensified with a new administration in the US, trade wars between the US and China, and Brexit, among many other political changes. It feels as though policy uncertainty is at the highest level it has been in the last 25 years. But it is important to remember the complexity of these developments and there are no certain answers.

The impact of political and economic policy has many forms and occurs at various stages. The first order impacts are transparent and easy to comprehend – for example, a tax on soya exports from the US to China will impact the price of soya beans. This will have a knock-on impact on palm oil, as soya bean oil competes with palm oil. It will also impact animal feed, which uses soya beans as a raw material. Consequently, meat and poultry prices will be high, which will impact inflation and other macro variables. The point I am trying to make is that the world economy is an extremely complex system and we need to be careful about interpretations we draw from any single policy action.

That said, we as investors need to remain alert to the implications of political crosswinds. My framework for considering the potential impact of changing policy focuses on two elements:

- Avoiding businesses where either the risk of policy impact is very high or where the stock market has failed to understand the unintended consequences of such a policy change; and
- (2) Not allowing myself to become frozen with fear, instead remaining vigilant for new opportunities. Markets sometimes punish stocks which are in the eye of the storm of a policy decision. I am especially interested in these scenarios as they can throw up wonderful businesses going through challenging circumstances which are likely to improve with time. These sorts of companies can be excellent investments for the patient investor.

Question

What is your outlook over the next 12 months?

Answer

I agree with Warren Buffet when he says: "forecasts tell you more about the forecaster than the future." With this in mind, I try to spend my time understanding the businesses that I invest in rather than forecasting the direction of the economy or the stock market.

The world is uncertain and I expect it to be a bumpy ride over the next 5 years. I am conscious that this is what I said last year, but I remain convinced that in times such as these, it is even more important to own good businesses. They must not be overly reliant on a positive macro environment, and must be run by competent management teams. As investors we must own them at prices which leave enough margin of safety for adverse economic situations. We will continue to work hard to accomplish this.

It also provides transmission related consultancy to more than 150 domestic clients, with a global footprint in over 20 countries, and it operates a Telecom business known as POWERTEL, which owns around 47,735 kms of telecommunications network.

BOC Aviation

Position size

BOC Aviation is a global aircraft operating leasing company. The company was founded in 1993, but was acquired by the Bank of China in 2006, at which point its name was changed to BOC Aviation. In the same year, the company was listed on the Main Board of the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong.

LIC Housing Finance

Position size

LIC Housing Finance is one of the largest housing finance companies in India. It focuses on supporting individuals financially when purchasing residential property. It primarily offers loans to those seeking to buy their own houses or flats, but also offers loans on existing properties. The company is registered in Mumbai, with several other offices across India and owns around 275 marketing offices.

Housing Development Finance Corporation ("HDFC")

Position size

HDFC is another leading provider of housing finance in India. It was founded in 1977, pioneering the housing finance industry in India. Since then, it has financed 6.2 million cumulative units and managed over 1.8 million deposit accounts. HDFC also operates over a broad range of financial services, including banking, insurance, asset management, and more. HDFC and its associate and subsidiary companies (including HDFC Bank) generally hold a significant market share over their respective sectors.





HDFC Bank

Position size

HDFC Bank is a subsidiary company of HDFC, and is one of India's leading private-sector banks. It focuses on three key business segments. The first is wholesale banking, where it concentrates on large manufacturing companies; the second is treasury, where it focuses on foreign exchange and derivatives, local currency money market and debt securities, and equities; and the third is retail banking.



Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company ("TSMC")

Position size

The company is listed on the Taiwan Stock Exchange as well as the New York Stock Exchange. It maintains its global presence with offices based in North America, Europe, Japan, China, South Korea, and its headquarters in Taiwan.

Bank Rakyat Indonesia is a leading Indonesian bank, and the country's most profitable lender. It focuses on micro, small, and medium-scale business segments. The bank can trace its history back to 1895, procuring over 120 years of banking experience in that time, and has since become the leading player in microfinance in Indonesia.

Position size

LT Group is a Philippines-based company with a diversified portfolio of underlying businesses, investing in areas such as beverages, real estate, tobacco and banking. The company has a long history and was initially incorporated in 1937 as The Manila Wine Merchants. Since then it has made a number of significant acquisitions of consumer-focused businesses



Cognizant Technology Solutions

Position size

Cognizant Technology Solutions is a multinational professional services company, providing services in IT, digital and technology. It primarily provides IT consulting and wider technology services across North America, Europe, and Asia. It is based in New Jersey, USA, and is included in the NASDAQ-100 and S&P 500 indices.









Strategic Report

The Directors have pleasure in presenting the Strategic Report of the Company. The Chairman's Statement and the Portfolio Manager's Review on pages 2 to 9 form part of the Strategic Report.

Business and Status

The Company carries on business as an investment company and has been accepted as an approved investment trust by HM Revenue & Customs under Sections 1158 and 1159 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010, subject to the Company continuing to meet eligibility conditions. The Directors are of the opinion that the Company has conducted its affairs in a manner which will satisfy the conditions for continued approval.

The Company is registered as an investment company under Section 833 of the Companies Act 2006 and its ordinary shares are listed and traded on the London Stock Exchange. It is not a close company and has no employees.

Objective

The Company's objective is to achieve long term capital growth principally from the stockmarkets of the Asian Region excluding

Strategy

In order to achieve this objective, the Company operates as an investment company and has an actively managed portfolio of investments. As an investment company, it is able to gear the portfolio and the Board takes the view that long term returns for shareholders can be enhanced by the use of gearing in a carefully considered and monitored way.

As part of the strategy, the Board has delegated the management of the portfolio and certain other services. The Portfolio Manager aims to achieve a total return on the Company's net assets over the longer term in excess of the equivalent return on the MSCI All Countries Asia ex Japan Index, the Company's Comparative Index. The stock selection approach adopted by the Portfolio Manager is considered to be well suited to achieving this objective.

The Company's objective, strategy and principal activity have remained unchanged throughout the year ended 31 July 2018.

Investment Management Philosophy, Style and Process

The portfolio is built on a stock by stock basis following the Portfolio Manager's assessment of the fundamental value available in individual securities, with geographical weightings the result of stock selection, rather than macroeconomic considerations. The portfolio's geographical weightings may vary significantly from the weightings within its Comparative Index and the concentration on the identification of fundamental value in individual stocks within the Asian Region excluding Japan may result in investments made against prevalent trends and local conventions. The Portfolio Manager invests in securities of companies which he considers to have fundamental value.

Investment Policy

The Company seeks to meet its investment objective through investment in a diversified portfolio of securities and instruments issued by or related to companies listed on the stockmarkets in the Asian Region excluding Japan but investments may be

made in companies listed elsewhere, which in the opinion of the Portfolio Manager, have significant interests in the Asian Region, excluding Japan.

In order to diversify the Company's portfolio, the Board has set broad guidelines for the Manager, which the Board reserves the right to amend as it sees fit, in respect of the country weightings of the portfolio. The Company may invest directly in the shares of companies or indirectly through equity related instruments (such as derivative contracts, warrants or convertible bonds) and in debt instruments. The Company may also invest in unquoted securities and in other investment funds, subject to the investment restrictions set out below.

No material change will be made to the investment policy without shareholder approval.

Investment Restrictions

The Company will invest and manage its assets with an objective of spreading risk with the following investment restrictions:

- No single or aggregate investment in any one company or other investment entity shall represent more than 10% of its Gross Assets, measured at the time of any investment.
- Up to 5% of its Gross Assets, at the time of investment, in securities which are not listed on any stock exchange. However the Portfolio Manager will not normally make any such investment, except where it is expected that the securities will become listed on a stock exchange in the foreseeable future.
- Up to 15% of its Gross Assets, at the time of investment, in other investment funds (whether listed or unlisted) where such funds offer the only practicable means of gaining exposure to a particular market in the Asian Region* excluding Japan. Within this limit, no more than 10% of Gross Assets, at the time of investment, may be invested in funds that do not have stated policies to invest more than 15% of their Gross Assets in other listed closed-ended funds.
- Up to 5% of its Gross Assets, at the time of investment, in securities which are not listed or domiciled in the Asian Region*, provided the investments have a strong Asian Region* rationale.
- Asian Region means the continent of Asia (including Hong Kong, South Korea, Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia, Taiwan, Indonesia, Philippines, China, India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka, but excluding Japan, the countries comprising the former U.S.S.R. and the Middle East), together with Australasia.

The Company is permitted to invest in Non-Voting Depositary Receipts, American Depositary Receipts, Global Depositary Receipts and Equity Linked Notes. Any such investment will be included in the relevant aggregate country weighting.

Use of Derivative Instruments

In order to meet its investment objective, the Company may utilise derivative instruments, including index-linked notes, futures, contracts for differences ("CFDs"), call options (including covered calls), put options and other equity related derivative instruments.



Derivatives usage will focus on, but will not be limited to the following investment strategies:

- As an alternative form of gearing to bank loans. The Company can enter into long CFDs which would achieve an equivalent effect to buying an asset financed by bank borrowing but often at lower financing costs. The Company does not currently use bank borrowings for gearing purposes.
- To hedge equity market risks where suitable protection can be purchased to limit the downside of a falling market at reasonable costs.
- To enhance the investment returns by taking short exposures on stocks that the Portfolio Manager considers to be overvalued

The Board has created strict policies and exposure limits and sub-limits to manage derivatives.

Derivative use is limited in terms of the value of the total portfolio to which the Company is exposed, whether through direct or indirect investment. The Board adopts the policy that:

- Net Market Exposure will not exceed the NAV of the Company by more than 30%; and
- Gross Asset Exposure will not exceed the NAV of the Company by more than 40%.

Notwithstanding the Board's intention in the medium to long term to maintain a Net Market Exposure within a range of between 90%-115%, in the short term the Net Market Exposure may fall outside of this range from time to time, having regard to the Portfolio Manager's investment style and philosophy as well as the markets he operates in. The sum of all short exposures of the Company under derivatives, excluding hedges, will not exceed 10% of total net assets.

The majority of the Company's exposure to equities will be through direct investment and not through derivatives. In addition, the limits on exposure to individual companies and groups are calculated after translating all derivative exposures into economically equivalent amounts of the underlying assets.

Dividend Policy

In order to continue to qualify as an investment company, the Company is required by Section 1159 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 to distribute sufficient net income so that it retains no more than 15% of its income in any reporting year. The Company currently only pays dividends out of revenue reserves.

Performance

The Company's performance for the year ended 31 July 2018, including a summary of the year's activities, and details on trends and factors that may impact the future performance of the Company, are included in the Chairman's Statement and the Portfolio Manager's Review on pages 2 to 9. The Forty Largest Holdings, the Distribution of the Portfolio, the Ten Year Record and the Summary of Performance Charts are on pages 17 to 25.

The Board recognises that investing in equities is a long term process and the Company's returns will vary from year to year.

Results and Dividends

The Company's results for the year ended 31 July 2018 are set out in the Income Statement on page 46. The net return on ordinary activities after taxation for the year was £6.8 million, of which the revenue return was £3.9 million. This equates to a basic return per ordinary share of 9.93 pence of which the revenue return was £7.0 pence.

The Directors recommend that a dividend of 5.50 pence (2017: 5.00 pence) per ordinary share be paid on 17 December 2018 to shareholders who appear on the share register as at the close of business on 12 October 2018 (ex-dividend date 11 October 2018).

Principal Risks and Uncertainties and Risk Management

As required by provision C.2.1 of the 2016 UK Corporate Governance Code, the Board has a robust ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the principal risks and uncertainties faced by the Company. The Board, with the assistance of the Alternative Investment Fund Manager (FIL Investment Services (UK) Limited/the "Manager"), has developed a risk matrix which, as part of the risk management and internal controls process, identifies the key risks that the Company faces. The risks identified are placed on the Company's risk matrix and graded appropriately. This process, together with the policies and procedures for the mitigation of risks, is updated and reviewed regularly in the form of comprehensive reports considered by the



Strategic Report continued

Audit Committee. The Board determines the nature and extent of any risks it is willing to take in order to achieve its strategic objectives.

The Manager also has responsibility for risk management for the Company. It works with the Board to identify and manage the

principal risks and uncertainties and to ensure that the Board can continue to meet its UK corporate governance obligations.

The Board considers the following as the principal risks and uncertainties faced by the Company. There have been no changes to these since the prior year.

Other risks facing the Company include:

Cybercrime risk

The risk posed by cybercrime is rated as significant and the Board receives regular updates from the Manager in respect of the type and possible scale of cyberattacks. The Manager's technology team has developed a number of initiatives and controls in order to provide enhanced mitigating protection to this ever increasing threat.

Tax and Regulatory risks

A breach of Section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 could lead to a loss of investment trust status resulting in the Company being subject to tax on capital gains.

The Board monitors tax and regulatory changes at each Board meeting and through active engagement with regulators and trade bodies by the Manager.

Operational risks

The Company relies on a number of third party service providers, principally the Manager, Registrar, Custodian and Depositary. It is dependent on the effective operation of the Manager's control systems and those of its service providers with regard to the security of the Company's assets, dealing procedures, accounting records and the maintenance of regulatory and legal requirements. They are subject to a risk-based programme of internal audits by the Manager. In addition, service providers' own internal control reports are received by the Board on an annual basis and any concerns investigated.

Continuation Vote

A continuation vote takes place every five years. There is a risk that shareholders do not vote in favour of continuation during periods when performance is poor. The next continuation vote will be at the AGM in 2021.

Viability Statement

In accordance with provision C.2.2 of the 2016 UK Corporate Governance Code, the Directors have assessed the prospects of the Company over a longer period than the twelve month period required by the "Going Concern" basis. The Company is an investment trust with the objective of achieving long term capital growth. The Board considers long term to be at least five years, and accordingly, the Directors believe that five years is an appropriate investment horizon to assess the viability of the Company, although the life of the Company is not intended to be limited to this or any other period.

In making an assessment on the viability of the Company, the Board has considered the following:

- The ongoing relevance of the investment objective in prevailing market conditions;
- The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Company, as set out above, and their potential impact;
- The future demand for the Company's shares;
- The Company's share price discount to the NAV;

- The liquidity of the Company's portfolio;
- The level of income generated by the Company; and
- Future income and expenditure forecasts.

The Company's performance has been strong over the five year reporting period to 31 July 2018, with a NAV total return of 89.6%, a share price total return of 110.6% and a Comparative Index return of 66.0%. The Board regularly reviews the investment policy and considers it to be appropriate. The Board has concluded that there is a reasonable expectation that the Company will be able to continue in operation and meet its liabilities as they fall due over the next five years based on the following considerations:

- The Manager's compliance with the Company's investment objective, its investment strategy and asset allocation;
- The fact that the portfolio comprises sufficient readily realisable securities which can be sold to meet funding requirements if necessary;
- The Board's discount management policy; and
- The ongoing processes for monitoring operating costs and income which are considered to be reasonable in comparison to the Company's total assets.

In addition, the Directors' assessment of the Company's ability to operate in the foreseeable future is included in the Going Concern Statement in the Directors' Report on page 27. The Company is also subject to a continuation vote at the AGM in 2021 and the Board expect that the vote, when due, will be approved.

Board Diversity

The Board carries out any candidate search against a set of objective criteria on the basis of merit, with due regard for the benefits of diversity on the Board, including gender. As at 31 July 2018, there were four male Directors and one female Director on the Board.

Employees, Social, Community and Human Rights Issues

The Company has no employees. All its Directors are non-executive and its day-to-day activities are carried out by third parties. There are therefore no disclosures to make in respect of employees.

The Fidelity group of companies (including the Manager, FIL Investment Services (UK) Limited and FIL Investments International) encourages Environmental, Social and Governance ("ESG") factors in its investment decision making process. It has been a signatory to the United Nations Principles for Responsible Investment (UNPRI) since 2012 and submits an annual report detailing how it incorporates ESG into its investment analysis.

The Company has not adopted a policy on human rights as it has no employees and its operational processes are delegated. As an investment company, the Company does not provide goods and services in the normal course of business and has no customers. Accordingly, the Board considers that the Company is not within the scope of the Modern Slavery Act 2015.

The Company's financial reports are printed by a company which has won awards for its environmental awareness and further details of this may be found on the back cover of this report.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions

The Company has no premises, consumes no electricity, gas or diesel fuel and consequently does not have a measureable carbon footprint. FIL Investment Services (UK) Limited and FIL Investments International are registered with the Carbon Reduction Commitment Energy Efficiency Scheme administered by the Environment Agency.

Socially Responsible Investment

The Manager's primary objective is to produce superior financial returns for the Company's shareholders. It believes that high standards of corporate social responsibility ("CSR") make good business sense and have the potential to protect and enhance investment returns. Consequently, its investment process takes social, environmental and ethical issues into account when, in the Manager's view, these have a material impact on either investment risk or return.

Corporate Engagement

The Board believes that the Company should, where appropriate, take an active interest in the affairs of the companies in which it invests and that it should exercise its voting rights at their general meetings. Unless there are any particularly controversial issues (which are then referred to the Board), it delegates the responsibility for corporate engagement and shareholder voting to the Manager. These activities are reviewed regularly by the Manager's corporate governance team and reported to the Board on at least an annual basis. Further details of the Manager's policy on corporate engagement can be found at www.fidelity.co.uk.

Future Developments

Some trends likely to affect the Company in the future are common to many investment companies together with the impact of regulatory change. The factors likely to affect the Company's future development, performance and positions are set out in the Chairman's Statement and the Portfolio Manager's Review on pages 2 to 9.





The Directors have pleasure in presenting their report and the audited Financial Statements of the Company for the year ended 31 July 2018.

The Company was incorporated in England and Wales as a public limited company on 2 April 1996 under the registered number 3183919 and commenced business as an investment trust on 13 June 1996.

Management Company

FIL Investment Services (UK) Limited ("FISL") is the Company's appointed Alternative Investment Fund Manager (the "AIFM"/"Manager"). FISL, as the Manager, has delegated the portfolio management of assets and the role of the company secretary to FIL Investments International.

The Alternative Investment Fund Management and Secretarial Services Agreement (the "Management Agreement") will continue unless and until terminated by either party giving to the other not less than six months' notice in writing. However, it may be terminated without compensation if the Company is liquidated, pursuant to the procedures laid down in the Articles of Association of the Company. It may also be terminated forthwith as a result of a material breach of the Management Agreement or on the insolvency of the Manager or the Company. In addition, the Company may terminate the Management Agreement by sixty days' notice if the Manager ceases to be a subsidiary of FIL Limited

The Board reviews the Management Agreement at least annually and details are included in the Corporate Governance Statement on pages 31 and 32.

Fee Arrangement

For the year ended 31 July 2018, the Company's annual management fee was charged on a tiered pricing structure which was 0.90% on the first \$200 million of gross assets and 0.85% on gross assets over \$200 million. In addition, the Company paid the Manager a secretarial and administration fee of \$75,000 per annum. Fees were calculated and paid quarterly.

Revised Fee Arrangement

As mentioned in the Chairman's Statement, and effective from 1 August 2018, the Company has adopted a new fee arrangement which provides an overall reduction from the tiered fee structure.

The variable management fee ("VMF") will be calculated daily by referencing the performance of the Company's NAV to the performance of the MSCI All Countries Asia ex Japan Index (net) total return in Sterling terms (the Company's Comparative Index). Under the VMF structure, the revised base management fee will be 0.70% of net assets. The period used to assess the performance will be the lesser of: (i) the time since 1 August 2018; or (ii) the previous 3 years (the "Performance Period").

The first three months, effective from 1 August 2018, will be charged solely at the base rate of 0.70% of net assets. This initial three month period will establish a performance history on which

the variable fee can be calculated, commencing on 1 November 2018, and building up, day by day to 3 years, after which the performance period will start to roll. The variable element of the fee will increase or decrease 0.033% for each percentage point of 3 year NAV per share outperformance or underperformance over the Comparative Index to a maximum of +0.20% or a minimum of -0.20%.

There are no limitations or restrictions on the Board's ability to buy back shares and any increase to NAV (performance attribution) from the repurchase or issue of shares will be removed from the fee calculation, so that the Manager cannot benefit from performance outside of portfolio management activities.

The Board

All Directors served on the Board throughout the year ended 31 July 2018 and up to the date of this report. A brief description of all serving Directors is shown on page 26 and indicates their qualifications for Board membership.

Directors' and Officers' Liability Insurance

In addition to the benefits under the Manager's global Directors' and Officers' liability insurance arrangements, the Company maintains additional insurance cover for its Directors under its own policy as permitted by the Companies Act 2006.

Going Concern Statement

The Directors have considered the Company's investment objective, risk management policies, liquidity risk, credit risk, capital management policies and procedures, the nature of its portfolio (being mainly securities which are readily realisable) and its expenditure and cash flow projections, and have concluded that the Company has adequate resources to continue to adopt the going concern basis for at least twelve months from the date of this Annual Report. The prospects of the Company over a period longer than twelve months can be found in the Viability Statement on page 15.

Auditor's Appointment

A resolution to reappoint Ernst & Young LLP as Auditor to the Company will be proposed at the AGM on 13 December 2018.

Disclosure of Information to the Company's Auditor

As required by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006, each Director in office as at the date of this report confirms that:

- (a) so far as each Director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the Company's Auditor is unaware; and
- (b) each Director has taken all the steps that ought to have been taken as a Director to make himself/herself aware of any audit information, and to establish that the Company's Auditor is aware of that information.

Registrar, Custodian and Depositary Arrangements

The Company has appointed Link Asset Services (previously Capita Asset Services) as its Registrar to manage the Company's share register, JPMorgan Chase Bank as its Custodian, which is primarily responsible for safeguarding the Company's assets, and J.P. Morgan Europe Limited, under a tri-partite agreement, as its Depositary, which is primarily responsible for the oversight of the custody of investment funds and the protection of investors' interests. Fees paid to these service providers are disclosed in Note 5 on page 52.

Share Capital

The Company's share capital comprises ordinary shares of 25 pence each and subscription shares of 0.001 pence each, both of which are fully listed on the London Stock Exchange. As at 31 July 2018, the issued share capital of the Company was 68,669,402 ordinary shares (2017: 67,488,213) and 12,316,033 subscription shares (2017: 13,497,222). No shares are held in Treasury.

Each ordinary share in issue carries one vote. The subscription shares do not carry voting rights.

Premium/Discount Management: Enhancing Shareholder Value

The Board recognises the importance of the relationship between the Company's share price and the NAV per share and monitors this closely. It seeks authority from shareholders each year to issue shares at a premium or to repurchase shares at a discount to the NAV, either for cancellation or for holding in Treasury. The Board will only exercise these authorities if deemed to be in the best interests of shareholders at the time.

Ordinary Share Issues

1,181,189 ordinary shares were issued on 30 November 2017, as a result of the first exercise of the rights attached to the subscription shares (2017: nil). No further shares have been issued since then and up to the date of this report. As at the date of this report, there are 12,316,033 subscription shares remaining to be exercised (2017: 13,497,222). The subscription share rights can be exercised annually in the 25 business days prior to the relevant subscription date. The next subscription date is on 30 November 2018 and the final date is on 29 November 2019.

At the AGM on 13 December 2018, resolutions will be proposed relating to the items of business set out in the Notice of Meeting on pages 69 and 70, including the items of special business summarised below.

Authority to Allot Shares

Resolution 11 is an ordinary resolution and provides the Directors with a general authority to allot securities in the Company up to an aggregate nominal value of £1,716,735. If passed, this resolution will enable the Directors to allot a maximum of 6,866,940 ordinary shares which represents approximately 10% of the issued ordinary share capital of the Company (including Treasury shares) as at 27 September 2018, and to impose any limits or restrictions and make any arrangements which they consider necessary or appropriate to deal with Treasury shares, fractional entitlements, record dates, legal, regulatory or practical problems in, or under the laws of, any territory or any other matter. The Directors would not intend to use this power unless they considered that it was in the interests of shareholders to do so. Any shares issued would be at no less than NAV per share or at a premium to NAV per share.

Authority to Disapply Pre-emption Rights

Resolution 12 is a special resolution disapplying pre-emption rights and granting authority to the Directors, without the need for further specific shareholder approval, to make allotments of equity securities or sale of Treasury shares for cash up to an aggregate nominal value of £1,716,735 (including Treasury shares) (approximately 10% of the issued ordinary share capital of the Company as at 27 September 2018 and equivalent to 6,866,940 ordinary shares).

Authority to Repurchase Ordinary Shares

Resolution 13 is a special resolution which renews the Company's authority to purchase up to 14.99% (10,293,543) of the ordinary shares in issue (excluding Treasury shares) on 27 September 2018, either for immediate cancellation or for retention as Treasury shares, at the determination of the Directors. Once shares are held in Treasury, the Directors may only dispose of them in accordance with the relevant legislation by subsequently selling the shares for cash or by cancelling the shares. Purchases of ordinary shares will be made at the discretion of the Directors and within guidelines set from time to time by them in the light of prevailing market conditions. Purchases will only be made in the market at prices below the prevailing NAV per share.

Authority to Repurchase Subscription Shares

Resolution 14 is a special resolution which renews the Company's authority to purchase up to 14.99% (1,846,173) of the subscription shares in issue (none are held as Treasury shares) on 27 September 2018 for cancellation. Purchases of subscription shares will be made at the discretion of the Directors and within guidelines set from time to time by them in the light of prevailing market conditions.

Recommendation: The Board considers that each of the resolutions is likely to promote the success of the Company and is in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole. The Directors unanimously recommend that you vote in favour of the resolutions as they intend to do in respect of their own beneficial holdings.

Corporate Governance Statement

The Corporate Governance Statement forms part of the Directors' Report. The Company is committed to maintaining high standards of corporate governance. Accordingly, the Board has put in place a framework for corporate governance which it believes is appropriate for an investment company.

Corporate Governance Codes

The Board follows the principles of the UK Corporate Governance Code (the "UK Code") issued by the Financial Reporting Council (the "FRC") in 2016 and the AlC's Code of Corporate Governance (the "AlC Code") issued by the Association of Investment Companies (the "AlC") in 2016. The FRC has confirmed that investment companies which report against the AlC Code and which follow the AlC Guide on Corporate Governance will meet their obligations under the UK Code and paragraph 9.8.6 of the Listing Rules. This statement, together with the Statement of Directors' Responsibilities on page 37, set out how the principles have been applied.

The AIC Code and the AIC Guide can be found on the AIC's website at **www.theaic.co.uk** and the UK Code can be found on the FRC's website at **www.frc.org.uk**.

Statement of Compliance

The Company has complied with the recommendations of the AIC Code and the relevant provisions of the UK Code for the year under review and up to the date of this report, except in relation to the UK Code provisions relating to the role of the chief executive; executive directors' remuneration; and the need for an internal audit function. For the reasons set out in the AIC Guide, and as explained in the UK Code, the Board considers that these provisions are not relevant to the position of the Company as it is an externally managed investment company and has no executive directors, employees or internal operations.

THE BOARD

Board Composition

The Board, chaired by Kate Bolsover, consists of five non-executive Directors. The Directors believe that, between them, they have good knowledge and wide experience of business in Asia and of investment companies and that the Board has an appropriate balance of skills, experience, independence and knowledge of the Company and length of service to discharge its duties and provide effective strategic leadership and proper governance of the Company.

Philip Smiley is the Senior Independent Director and fulfils the role of sounding board for the Chairman, intermediary for the other Directors as necessary and he acts as a channel of communication for shareholders in the event that contact through the Chairman is inappropriate.

Biographical details of all the Directors are on page 26.

Board Responsibilities and Board Meetings


The Board has overall responsibility for the Company's affairs and for promoting the long term success of the Company. All matters which are not delegated to the Company's Manager under the Management Agreement are reserved for the Board's decision. Matters reserved for the Board and considered at meetings include decisions on strategy, management, structure, capital, share issues, share repurchases, gearing, financial reporting, risk management, investment performance, share price discount, corporate governance, Board appointments and the appointments of the Manager and the Company Secretary. The Board also considers shareholder issues including communication and investor relations.

All Directors are independent of the Manager and considered to be free from any relationship which could materially interfere with the exercise of their independent judgement. The Board follows a procedure of notification of other interests that may arise as part of considering any potential conflicts and is satisfied that none have arisen in the year under review.

All Directors are able to allocate sufficient time to the Company to discharge their responsibilities fully and effectively. Each Director is entitled to take independent professional advice, at the Company's expense, in the furtherance of their duties.

The Board considers that it meets sufficiently regularly to discharge its duties effectively and the table on page 31 gives the attendance record for the meetings held during the reporting year. The Portfolio Manager and key representatives of the Manager are in attendance at these meetings. Between these meetings there is regular contact with the Manager and other meetings are arranged as necessary. Additionally, Board Committees and sub-groups meet to pursue matters referred to them by the Board and the Chairman is in contact with the other Directors regularly without representatives of the Manager being present.

In addition to the formal Board and Committee meetings, the Board undertakes a due diligence trip to Asia every other year. During this trip, the Board meets with the management of existing and potential investee companies alongside the Portfolio Manager. The Board also meets with Fidelity's research and analyst teams. Further information on the most recent trip can be found in the Chairman's Statement on page 3. The Board also holds a strategy meeting every other year that it is not in Asia for the due diligence trip. This allows an opportunity for the Board to focus on specific strategic matters.



Figures indicate those meetings for which each Director was eligible to attend and attended in the year. Regular Board meetings exclude ad hoc meetings for formal approvals as well as the due diligence trip to Asia.

Since the end of the reporting period, the Directors have also had a Management Engagement Committee meeting at which they reviewed the performance of the Manager and the terms of the Company's Management Agreement.

Company Secretary

The Board has access to the advice and services of the Company Secretary. The Company Secretary is responsible to the Board for ensuring Board procedures are followed and that applicable rules and regulations are complied with.

Changes to the Board

Changes to the Board take place in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Company's Articles of Association and the AIC Code. The Nomination Committee is responsible for identifying possible candidates. However, any proposal for a new Director is discussed and approved by the entire Board.

Director Training

Upon appointment, each Director is provided with all relevant information regarding the Company and receives training on the investment operations and administration functions of the Company, together with a summary of their duties and responsibilities to the Company. Directors also receive regular briefings from, amongst others, the AIC, the Company's Auditor and the Company Secretary, regarding any proposed developments or changes in law or regulations that affect the Company and/or the Directors.

Election and Re-Election of Directors

All newly appointed Directors stand for election by the shareholders at the AGM following their appointment by the Board. All other Directors are subject to annual re-election. Directors standing for re-election at this year's AGM are accompanied by sufficient biographical details on page 26 to enable shareholders to make an informed decision. The terms and letters of appointment of Directors are available for inspection at the registered office of the Company and will be available prior to the AGM.

Board Evaluation

An annual evaluation of the Board, its Directors and its Committees is undertaken and takes the form of written questionnaires and discussions. The performance of the Chairman is evaluated by the other Directors. The results of these evaluations are discussed

by the Board and the process is considered to be constructive in terms of identifying areas for improving the functioning and performance of the Board and its Committees and action is taken on the basis of these results. The Board considers tenure as one of the matters under review during the evaluation process. A Director may serve for more than nine years, provided that the Director is considered by the Board to continue to be independent. The Board has a policy that a Chairman must step down after nine years in that role but may remain thereafter as an independent Director, subject to annual re-election.

Directors' Remuneration and Share Interests

Details of Directors' remuneration and share interests are disclosed in the Directors' Remuneration Report on pages 35 and 36.

BOARD COMMITTEES

The Board has three Committees through which it discharges certain of its corporate governance responsibilities. These are the Audit Committee, the Management Engagement Committee and the Nomination Committee. Terms of reference of each Committee can be found on the Company's pages of the Manager's website at www.fidelityinvestmenttrusts.com.

Audit Committee

The Audit Committee is chaired by Grahame Stott and consists of all of the Directors. Full details are disclosed in the Report of the Audit Committee on pages 38 to 40.

Management Engagement Committee

The Management Engagement Committee is chaired by Timothy Scholefield and consists of all of the Directors. It meets at least once a year and reports to the Board, making recommendations where appropriate. It is charged with reviewing and monitoring the performance of the Manager and ensuring that the terms of the Company's Management Agreement remain competitive and reasonable for shareholders.

Ahead of the AGM, the Committee has reviewed the performance of the Manager and the fee basis and also that of its peers. The Committee noted the Company's good long

term performance and the commitment, quality and continuity of the team responsible for the Company and concluded that it was in the interests of shareholders that the appointment of the Manager should continue. Details of the fee for the year ended 31 July 2018 and the revised fee structure effective from 1 August 2018 is in the Directors' Report on page 27.

Nomination Committee

The Nomination Committee is chaired by Kate Bolsover and consists of all of the Directors. It meets at least once a year and reviews the composition, size and structure of the Board and makes recommendations to the Board as appropriate. It is charged with nominating new Directors for consideration by the Board, and in turn for approval by shareholders. The search for a candidate is carried out against a set of objective criteria, with due regard for the benefits of diversity on the Board, including gender. New Directors are appointed on the basis of merit and this process has led to a diverse Board membership. External consultants may be used to identify future potential candidates.

The Committee is responsible for succession planning for Directors' appointments.

The Committee also considers the election and re-election of Directors ahead of each AGM. For the forthcoming AGM, it has considered the performance and contribution to the Company of each Director and concluded that each Director has been effective and continues to demonstrate commitment to their role. Accordingly, the Committee has recommended their continued service to the Board.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT

Financial Reporting

Set out on page 37 is a statement by the Directors of their responsibilities in respect of the preparation of the Annual Report and Financial Statements. The Independent Auditor has set out its reporting responsibilities within its report on pages 41 to 45.

The Board has a responsibility to present a fair, balanced and understandable assessment of annual and half-yearly financial statements, other price sensitive public reports and reports to regulators, and to provide information required to be presented by statutory requirements. All such reports are reviewed by the Audit Committee and approved by the Board prior to their issue to ensure that this responsibility is fulfilled.

Risk Management and Internal Controls

The Board is responsible for the Company's systems of risk management and internal controls and for reviewing their effectiveness. The review takes place at least once a year. Such systems are designed to manage rather than eliminate risk of failure to achieve business objectives and can only provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Board determines the nature and extent of any risks it is willing to take in order to achieve its strategic objectives. It is responsible for the design, implementation and maintenance of controls and procedures to safeguard the assets of the Company although these tasks have been delegated on a day-to-day basis to the Manager. The system extends to operational

and compliance controls and risk management. Clear lines of accountability have been established between the Board and the Manager. The Manager provides regular reports on controls and compliance issues to the Audit Committee and the Board. In carrying out its review, the Audit Committee has regard to the activities of the Manager, the Manager's compliance and risk functions and the work carried out by the Company's Auditor. The review also includes consideration of similar internal controls reports issued by other service providers.

The Board, assisted by the Manager, has undertaken a rigorous risk and controls assessment. It confirms that there is an effective ongoing process in place to identify, evaluate and manage the Company's principal business and operational risks, and that it has been in place throughout the year ended 31 July 2018 and up to the date of this report. This process is in accordance with the FRC's "Risk Management, Internal Control and Related Financial Business Reporting" guidance.

The Board has reviewed the need for an internal audit function and has determined that the systems and procedures employed by the Manager, which are subject to inspection by the Manager's internal and external audit processes, provide sufficient assurance that a sound system of internal controls is maintained to safeguard shareholders' investments and the Company's assets. An internal audit function, specific to the Company, is therefore considered unnecessary. The Audit Committee meets the Manager's internal audit representative at least once a year. It receives a summary of the Manager's externally audited internal controls report on an annual basis.

Whistle-Blowing Procedure

Part of the Manager's role in ensuring the provision of a good service, pursuant to the Management Agreement, includes the ability for employees of Fidelity to raise concerns through a workplace concerns escalation policy (or "whistle-blowing procedure"). Fidelity has advised the Board that it is committed to providing the highest level of service to its customers and to applying the highest standards of quality, honesty, integrity and probity. The aim of the policy is to encourage employees and others working for Fidelity to assist the Company in tackling fraud, corruption and other malpractice within the organisation and in setting standards of ethical conduct. This policy has been endorsed accordingly by the Board.

Bribery Act 2010

The Company is committed to carrying out business fairly, honestly and openly. The Board recognises the benefits this has to reputation and business confidence. The Board, the Manager, the Manager's employees and others acting on the Company's behalf, are expected to demonstrate high standards of behaviour when conducting business.

The Board acknowledges its responsibility for the implementation and oversight of the Company's procedures for preventing bribery, and the governance framework for training, communication, monitoring, reporting and escalation of compliance together with enforcing action as appropriate. The Board has adopted a zero tolerance policy in this regard.



Criminal Finances Act 2017

The Company is subject to the Criminal Finances Act 2017 and follows a zero tolerance policy to tax evasion and its facilitation. The Directors are fully committed to complying with all legislation and appropriate guidelines designed to prevent tax evasion and the facilitation of tax evasion in the jurisdictions in which the Company, its service providers, counterparties and business partners operate.

Responsibility as an Institutional Shareholder

The Board has adopted the Manager's Principles of Ownership in relation to investments. These Principles include the pursuit of an active investment policy through portfolio management decisions, voting on resolutions at general meetings and maintaining a continuing dialogue with the management of investee companies. Fidelity is a signatory to the UK Stewardship Code setting out the responsibilities of institutional shareholders and agents. Further details of the Manager's Principles of Ownership and voting may be found at www.fidelity.co.uk.

Relations with Shareholders

Communication with shareholders is given a high priority by the Board and it liaises with the Manager and the Company's broker who are in regular contact with the Company's major institutional investors to canvass shareholder opinion and to communicate its views to shareholders. All Directors are made aware of shareholders' concerns and the Chairman, the Senior Independent Director and, where appropriate, other Directors, are available to meet with shareholders to discuss strategy and governance. The Board regularly monitors the shareholder profile of the Company and receives regular reports from the Manager on meetings attended with shareholders and any concerns raised in such meetings. The Board aims to provide the maximum opportunity for dialogue between the Company and shareholders. If any shareholder wishes to contact a member of the Board directly they should either email the Company Secretary at **investmenttrusts@fil.com** or write to the address provided on page 74. The Company Secretary will attend to any enquiries promptly and ensure that they are directed to the Chairman, Senior Independent Director or the Board as a whole, as appropriate.

The Board encourages all shareholders to attend the AGM on 13 December 2018 at which they will have the opportunity to meet and address questions to the Chairman and other members of the Board, the Portfolio Manager and representatives of the Manager.

The Notice of Meeting on pages 69 to 71 sets out the business of the AGM and the special business resolutions are explained more fully on page 29 of the Directors' Report. A separate resolution is proposed on each substantially separate issue including the Annual Report and Financial Statements. The Notice of the AGM and related papers are sent to shareholders at least 20 working days before the Meeting.

Voting rights in the Company's shares

Every person entitled to vote on a show of hands has one vote. On a poll every shareholder who is present in person or by proxy or representative has one vote for every ordinary share held. At general meetings all proxy votes are counted and, except where a poll is called, proxy voting is reported for each resolution after it has been dealt with on a show of hands. The proxy voting results are disclosed on the Company's pages of the Manager's website at www.fidelityinvestmenttrusts.com.

Articles of Association

Changes to the Company's Articles of Association must be made by special resolution.

Directors' Remuneration Report

Chairman's Statement

The Directors' Remuneration Report for the year ended 31 July 2018 has been prepared in accordance with the Large & Medium-sized Companies & Groups (Accounts & Reports) (Amendment) Regulations 2013 (the "Regulations"). As the Board is comprised entirely of non-executive Directors and has no chief executive officer and employees, many parts of the Regulations, in particular those relating to chief executive officer pay and employee pay, do not apply and are therefore not disclosed in this report.

An ordinary resolution to approve both the Directors' Remuneration Report (excluding the Remuneration Policy) will be put to shareholders at the AGM on 13 December 2018. The Company's Auditor is required to audit certain sections of this report and where such disclosures have been audited, the specific section has been indicated as such. The Auditor's opinion is included in its report on pages 41 to 45.

Directors' Remuneration

The fee structure with effect from 1 August 2018 is as follows: Chairman: £34,000 (2017: £32,000); Chairman of the Audit Committee: £28,000 (2017: £26,500); and Directors: £25,000 (2017: £24,000). Increases in Directors' remuneration are made to ensure that fees remain competitive and sufficient to attract and retain the quality of Directors needed to manage the Company successfully.

The Remuneration Policy

The Remuneration Policy is subject to a binding vote, in the form of an ordinary resolution, at every third AGM. A binding vote means that if it is not successful the Board will be obliged to revise the policy and seek further shareholder approval at a General Meeting specially convened for that purpose. The current policy, which was approved at last year's AGM, is set out below.

The Company's Articles of Association limit the aggregate fees payable to each Director to £50,000 per annum. Subject to this overall limit, it is the Board's policy to determine the level of Directors' fees having regard to the time spent by them on the Company's affairs; the level of fees payable to non-executive directors in the industry generally; the requirement to attract and retain individuals with suitable knowledge and experience; and the role that individual Directors fulfil. Other than fees and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred in attending to the affairs of the Company, the Directors are not eligible for any performance related pay or benefits, pension related benefits, share options, long term incentive schemes or other taxable benefits. The Directors are not entitled to exit payments and are not provided with any compensation for loss of office. Directors fees are paid monthly in arrears. Directors do not serve a notice period if their appointment were to be terminated.

The level of Directors' fees is determined by the whole Board. Directors do not vote on their own individual fees. The Board reviews the Company's Remuneration Policy and implementation on an annual basis. Reviews are based on information provided by the Company's Manager and research from third parties and it includes information on the fees of other similar investment

No Director has a service contract with the Company. New Directors are provided with a letter of appointment which, amongst other things, provides that their appointment is subject to the Companies Act 2006 and the Company's Articles of Association. Copies of the Directors' letters of appointment are available at each of the Company's AGM and can be obtained from the Company's registered office.

The Company's Remuneration Policy will apply to new Board members, who will be paid at the equivalent amount of fees as current Board members.

Voting on the Remuneration Policy

The Remuneration Policy (the "Policy"), as set out above, was approved at the AGM on 7 December 2017 with 98.72% of votes cast in favour, 0.90% of votes cast against and 0.38% of votes withheld. The next vote will be put to shareholders at the AGM in 2020. The Policy has been followed throughout the year ended 31 July 2018 and up to the date of this report.

Voting on the Directors' Remuneration Report

At the AGM held on 7 December 2017, 98.60% of votes were cast in favour of the Directors' Remuneration Report for the year ended 31 July 2017, 0.89% of votes were cast against and 0.51% of votes were withheld.

The Director's Remuneration Report for the year ended 31 July 2018 will be put to shareholders at the AGM on 13 December 2018, and the votes cast will be disclosed on the Company's pages of the Manager's website at:

www.fidelityinvestmenttrusts.com.

Single Total Figure of Remuneration

The single total aggregate Directors' remuneration for the year under review was £131,545 (2017: £124,246). This includes expenses incurred by Directors in attending to the affairs of the Company and which are considered by HMRC to be a taxable benefit. 

The primary responsibilities of the Committee are to ensure the integrity of the Company's financial reporting, the appropriateness of the risk management and internal controls processes and the effectiveness of the independent audit process and how this has been assessed for the year ended 31 July 2018

Composition

The members of the Committee are myself as Chairman, Kate Bolsover, Timothy Scholefield, Philip Smiley and Michael Warren. Kate Bolsover is a member of the Committee because the Board believes it to be appropriate for all Directors to have such responsibility. The Committee considers that collectively its members have sufficient recent and relevant financial experience to discharge their responsibilities fully.

The Committee's performance is evaluated annually as part of the overall Board evaluation process.

Role and Responsibilities

The Committee's authority and duties are clearly defined in its terms of reference which are available on the Company's pages of the Manager's website at **www.fidelityinvestmenttrusts.com**. These duties include:

 Establishing with the Auditor the nature and scope of the audit, reviewing the Auditor's quality control procedures and reporting, the effectiveness of the audit process and the Auditor's independence and objectivity with particular regard to the provision of non-audit services;

Valuation, existence and ownership of investments (including derivatives)

The Committee took comfort from the Depositary's regular oversight reports that investment related activities are conducted in accordance with the Company's investment policy. The Committee received reports from the Manager and Depositary that the valuation, existence and ownership of investments had been verified. In addition, the Committee received confirmation from the Auditor that it has tested at the year end the valuation of the Company's investments and derivatives by reference to independent sources and had also confirmed the existence and ownership of the Company's investments with the Company's Custodian and that of the derivatives with the Company's counterparties. The valuation of one investment subject to fair value oversight by the Manager's Fair Value Committee ("FVC") was reviewed by the Committee. It receives reporting from the FVC and reviews the proposed valuation methodology to be adopted.

- The statement by the Auditor that it remains independent within the meaning of the regulators and their professional standards.

With regard to the effectiveness of the audit process, the Committee reviewed:

- The fulfilment by the Auditor of the agreed audit plan;

Our application of materiality

Materiality

The magnitude of an omission or misstatement that, individually or in the aggregate, could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of the users of the financial statements. Materiality provides a basis for determining the nature and extent of our audit procedures.

We determined materiality for the company to be £2.88m (2017: £2.80m), which is 1% (2017: 1%) of the net asset value of the Company as of 31 July 2018. We believe that the net asset value provides the most important financial metric on which shareholders judge the performance of the Company and it is a generally accepted auditing practice for investment trust audits.

Performance materiality

The application of materiality at the individual account or balance level. It is set at an amount to reduce to an appropriately low level the probability that the aggregate of uncorrected and undetected misstatements exceeds materiality.

On the basis of our risk assessments, together with our assessment of the Company's overall control environment, our judgement was that performance materiality was 75% (2017: 75%) of our planning materiality, namely \$2.16m (2017: \$2.10m). We have set performance materiality at this percentage due to past experience of the audit that indicates a lower risk of misstatements, both corrected and uncorrected.

Given the importance of the distinction between revenue and capital for the Company, we have also applied a separate testing threshold for the revenue column of the Income Statement of $\mathfrak{L}0.23$ m (2017: $\mathfrak{L}0.24$ m) being 5% of the net return on ordinary activities before taxation.

Reporting threshold

An amount below which identified misstatements are considered as being clearly trivial.

We agreed with the Audit Committee that we would report to them all uncorrected audit differences in excess of £0.14m (2017: £0.14m), which is set at 5% of planning materiality, as well as differences below that threshold that, in our view, warranted reporting on qualitative grounds.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1 Principal Activity

Fidelity Asian Values PLC is an Investment Company incorporated in England and Wales with a premium listing on the London Stock Exchange. The Company's registration number is 3183919, and its registered office is Beech Gate, Millfield Lane, Lower Kingswood, Tadworth, Surrey KT20 6RP. The Company has been approved by HM Revenue & Customs as an Investment Trust under Section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and intends to conduct its affairs so as to continue to be approved.

2 Accounting Policies

The Company has prepared its Financial Statements in accordance with UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("UK GAAP"), including FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", issued by the Financial Reporting Council ("FRC"). The Financial Statements have also been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Financial Statements of Investment Trust Companies and Venture Capital Trusts ("SORP") issued by the Association of Investment Companies ("AIC"), in November 2014 and updated in January 2017 with consequential amendments. The Company is exempt from presenting a Cash Flow Statement as a Statement of Changes in Equity is presented and substantially all of the Company's investments are highly liquid and are carried at market value.

- **a) Basis of accounting** The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis and under the historical cost convention, except for the measurement at fair value of investments and derivative instruments.
- b) Significant accounting estimates and judgements The Directors make judgements and estimates concerning the future. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, such as expectations of future events, and are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The judgements required in order to determine the appropriate valuation methodology of level 3 financial instruments have a risk of causing an adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets. These judgements include making assessments of the possible valuations in the event of a listing or other marketability related risks.
- c) Segmental reporting The Company is engaged in a single segment business and, therefore, no segmental reporting is provided.
- d) Presentation of the Income Statement In order to reflect better the activities of an investment company and in accordance with guidance issued by the AIC, supplementary information which analyses the Income Statement between items of a revenue and capital nature has been prepared alongside the Income Statement. The net revenue return after taxation for the year is the measure the Directors believe appropriate in assessing the Company's compliance with certain requirements set out in Section 1159 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010.
- e) Income Income from equity investments is accounted for on the date on which the right to receive the payment is established, normally the ex-dividend date. Overseas dividends are accounted for gross of any tax deducted at source. Amounts are credited to the revenue column of the Income Statement. Where the Company has elected to receive its dividends in the form of additional shares rather than cash, the amount of the cash dividend foregone is recognised in the revenue column of the Income Statement. Any excess in the value of the shares received over the amount of the cash dividend is recognised in the capital column of the Income Statement. Special dividends are treated as a revenue receipt or a capital receipt depending on the facts and circumstances of each particular case.

Derivative instrument income received from dividends on long contracts for difference ("CFDs") are accounted for on the date on which the right to receive the income is established, normally the ex-dividend date. The amount net of tax is credited to the revenue column of the Income Statement.

Interest received on CFDs and bank deposits is accounted for on an accruals basis and is credited to the revenue column of the Income Statement.

- f) Management fees and other expenses Management fees and other expenses are accounted for on an accruals basis and are charged in full to the revenue column of the Income Statement.
- g) Functional currency and foreign exchange The Directors, having regard to the Company's share capital and the predominant currency in which its investors operate, have determined its functional currency to be UK Sterling. UK Sterling is also the currency in which the Financial Statements are presented. Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are reported in UK Sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the Balance Sheet date. Foreign exchange gains and losses arising on translation are recognised in the Income Statement as a revenue or a capital item depending on the nature of the underlying item to which they relate.
- h) Finance costs Finance costs comprise interest paid on CFDs, which is accounted for on an accruals basis using the effective interest method, and dividends paid on short CFDs, which are accounted for on the date on which the obligation to incur the cost is established, normally the ex-dividend date. Finance costs are charged in full to the revenue column of the Income Statement.



2 Accounting Policies continued

i) Taxation - The taxation charge represents the sum of current taxation and deferred taxation.

Current taxation is taxation suffered at source on overseas income less amounts recoverable under taxation treaties. Taxation is charged or credited to the revenue column of the Income Statement, except where it relates to items of a capital nature, in which case it is charged or credited to the capital column of the Income Statement. Where expenses are allocated between revenue and capital any tax relief in respect of the expenses is allocated between revenue and capital returns on the marginal basis using the Company's effective rate of corporation tax for the accounting period. The Company is an approved Investment Trust under Section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and is not liable for UK taxation on capital gains.

Deferred taxation is the taxation expected to be payable or recoverable on timing differences between the treatment of certain items for accounting purposes and their treatment for the purposes of computing taxable profits. Deferred taxation is based on tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted when the taxation is expected to be payable or recoverable. Deferred taxation assets are only recognised if it is considered more likely than not that there will be sufficient future taxable profits to utilise them.

j) Dividend paid - Dividends payable to equity shareholders are recognised when the Company's obligation to make payment is established.

k) Investments – The Company's business is investing in financial instruments with a view to profiting from their total return in the form of income and capital growth. This portfolio of investments is managed and its performance evaluated on a fair value basis, in accordance with a documented investment strategy, and information about the portfolio is provided on that basis to the Company's Board of Directors. Investments are measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in profit or loss, in accordance with the provisions of both Section 11 and Section 12 of FRS 102. The fair value of investments is initially taken to be their cost and is subsequently measured as follows:

- Listed investments are valued at bid prices, or last market prices, depending on the convention of the exchange on which they are listed, or otherwise, at fair value based on published price quotations.
- Unlisted investments, are investments which are not quoted, or are not frequently traded, and are stated at the Directors best estimate of fair value. The Manager's Fair Value Committee, which is independent of the Portfolio Manager's team, provide a recommendation of fair values to the Directors based on recognised valuation techniques that take into account the cost of the investment, recent arm's length transactions in the same or similar investments and financial performance of the investment since purchase.

In accordance with the AIC SORP, the Company includes transaction costs, incidental to the purchase or sale of investments, within gains on investments in the capital column of the Income Statement and has disclosed those costs in Note 10.

I) Derivative instruments - When appropriate, permitted transactions in derivative instruments are used. Derivative transactions into which the Company may enter include CFDs, forward currency contracts, futures, options and warrants. Derivatives are classified as other financial instruments and are initially accounted and measured at fair value on the date the derivative contract is entered into and subsequently measured at fair value as follows:

- · Long and short CFDs the difference between the strike price and the value of the underlying shares in the contract;
- Futures the difference between contract price and the quoted trade price;
- Warrants the guoted trade price for the contract;
- · Options valued based on similar instruments or the quoted trade price for the contract; and
- Forward currency contracts valued at the appropriate quoted forward foreign exchange rate ruling at the Balance Sheet date.

Where transactions are used to protect or enhance income, if the circumstances support this, the income and expenses derived are included in net income in the revenue column of the Income Statement. Where such transactions are used to protect or enhance capital, if the circumstances support this, the income and expenses derived are included in gains on derivative instruments in the capital column of the Income Statement. Any positions on such transactions open at the year end are reflected on the Balance Sheet at their fair value within current assets or current creditors.

m) Debtors - Debtors include securities sold for future settlement, accrued income and other debtors incurred in the ordinary course of business. If collection is expected in one year or less (or in the normal operating cycle of the business, if longer) they are classified as current assets. If not, they are presented as non-current assets. They are recognised initially at fair value and, where applicable, subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.



2 Accounting Policies continued

- **n) Amounts held at futures clearing houses and brokers** These are amounts held in segregated accounts as collateral on behalf of brokers and are carried at amortised cost.
- **o)** Other creditors Other creditors include securities purchased for future settlement, investment management fees, secretarial and administration fees and other creditors and expenses accrued in the ordinary course of business. If payment is due within one year or less (or in the normal operating cycle of the business, if longer) they are classified as current liabilities. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. They are recognised initially at fair value and, where applicable, subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.
- **p) Cash at bank** Cash at bank is subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.
- q) Capital reserve The following are accounted for in the capital reserve:
- Gains and losses on the disposal of investments and derivative instruments;
- Changes in the fair value of investments and derivative instruments held at the year end;
- Foreign exchange gains and losses of a capital nature;
- Dividends receivable which are capital in nature;
- · Other expenses which are capital in nature; and
- Taxation charged or credited relating to items which are capital in nature.

As a result of technical guidance issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales in TECH 02/10: Guidance on the determination of realised profits and losses in the context of distributions under the Companies Act 2006, changes in the fair value of investments which are readily convertible to cash, without accepting adverse terms at the Balance Sheet date, can be treated as realised. Capital reserves realised and unrealised are shown in aggregate as capital reserve in the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Balance Sheet. At the Balance Sheet date, the portfolio of the Company consisted of investments listed on a recognised stock exchange and derivative instruments contracted with counterparties having an adequate credit rating, and the portfolio was considered to be readily convertible to cash, with the exception of the level 3 investment which had an unrealised investment holding loss of £296 (2017: nil).

A bonus issue of subscription shares to ordinary shareholders on the basis of one subscription share for every five ordinary shares held took place on 5 December 2016. Each subscription share gives the holder the right, but not the obligation, to subscribe for one ordinary share upon payment of the subscription price. The subscription price is based on the published unaudited NAV per ordinary share at 2 December 2016, plus a premium depending upon the year in which the right is exercised. The subscription share rights can be exercised annually in the 25 business days prior to the relevant subscription date (on which the exercises would take effect). After the final exercise date of 29 November 2019, the Company will appoint a trustee who will exercise any rights remaining that have not been exercised by shareholders, providing that by doing so a profit can be realised. To realise a profit the sale proceeds from selling the resulting ordinary shares in the market would need to be in excess of the 392.75 pence per share price of exercising the rights, plus any related expenses and fees. Any resulting profit will be paid to the holders of those outstanding subscription shares, unless the amount payable to an individual holder is less than £5, in which case such sum shall be retained for the benefit of the Company.

Subscription shares carry no rights to vote, to receive a dividend or to participate in the winding up of the Company.

During the year the Company issued 1,181,189 ordinary shares (year ended 31 July 2017: nil) on the exercise of rights attached to subscription shares. The subscription share price of 370.75 pence per ordinary share issued represented a premium of 345.75 pence per share over the 25 pence nominal value of each share. The total premium received in the year on the issue of ordinary shares of £4,084,000 (year ended 31 July 2017: nil) was credited to the share premium account.

15 Reserves

The "share premium account" represents the amount by which the proceeds, from the issue of ordinary shares on the exercise of rights attached to subscription shares, exceeded the nominal value of those ordinary shares. It is not distributable by way of dividend. It cannot be used to fund share repurchases.

The "capital redemption reserve" maintains the equity share capital of the Company and represents the nominal value of shares repurchased and cancelled. It is not distributable by way of dividend. It cannot be used to fund share repurchases.

The "other non-distributable reserve" represents amounts transferred from the warrant reserve in prior years with High Court approval. It is not distributable by way of dividend. It cannot be used to fund share repurchases.

The "other reserve" represents amounts transferred from the share premium account and the capital redemption reserve in prior years with High Court approval. It is not distributable by way of dividend. It can be used to fund share repurchases.

The "capital reserve" reflects realised gains or losses on investments and derivative instruments sold, unrealised increases and decreases in the fair value of investments and derivative instruments held and other income and costs recognised in the capital column of the Income Statement. Refer to Notes 10 and 11 for information on investment holding gains/(losses) included in this reserve. It can be used to fund share repurchases and it is distributable by way of dividend. The Board has stated that it has no current intention to pay dividends out of capital.

The "revenue reserve" represents retained revenue surpluses recognised through the revenue column of the Income Statement. It is distributable by way of dividend.

16 Net Asset Value per Ordinary Share

The basic net asset value per ordinary share is based on net assets of £287,974,000 (2017: £280,191,000) and on 68,669,402 (2017: 67,488,213) ordinary shares, being the number of ordinary shares of 25 pence each held outside Treasury in issue at the year end.

The diluted net asset value per ordinary share reflects the potential dilution in the net asset value per ordinary share if the rights of the 12,316,033 subscription shares in issue had been exercised on 31 July 2018 at the next exercise date price of 381.75 pence per share. The basis of the calculation is in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the AIC.

The net asset value per ordinary share and the diluted net asset value per ordinary share are published by the London Stock Exchange on a daily basis.

Management of risk

The Company's investing activities in pursuit of its investment objective involve certain inherent risks. The Board confirms that there is an ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the risks faced by the Company. The Board with the assistance of the Manager, has developed a risk matrix which, as part of the internal control process, identifies the risks that the Company faces. Principal risks identified are market, performance, discount control, gearing, derivatives and currency risks. Other risks identified are cybercrime, tax and regulatory and operational risks, including those relating to third party service providers covering investment management, marketing and business development, company secretarial, fund administration and operations and support functions. Risks are identified and graded in this process, together with steps taken in mitigation, and are updated and reviewed on an ongoing basis. Risks identified are shown in the Strategic Report on pages 14 and 15.

This note refers to the identification, measurement and management of risks potentially affecting the value of financial instruments. The Company's financial instruments may comprise:

- · Equity shares held in accordance with the Company's investment objective and policies;
- · Derivative instruments which comprise CFDs, forward currency contracts, warrants, futures and options on equity indices; and
- Cash, liquid resources and short term receivables and payables that arise from its operations.

The risks identified arising from the Company's financial instruments are market price risk (which comprises interest rate risk, foreign currency risk and other price risk), liquidity risk, counterparty risk, credit risk and derivative instrument risk. The Board reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks, which are summarised below. These policies are consistent with those followed last year.

Market price risk

Interest rate risk

The Company finances its operations through its share capital and reserves. In addition, the Company has gearing through the use of derivative instruments. The level of gearing is reviewed by the Board and the Portfolio Manager. The Company is exposed to a financial risk as a result of any increases in interest rates associated with the funding of the derivative instruments.

Foreign currency risk

The Company's net return on ordinary activities after taxation and its net assets can be affected by foreign exchange rate movements because the Company has income, assets and liabilities which are denominated in currencies other than the Company's functional currency which is UK Sterling. The Portfolio Manager may seek to manage exposure to currency movements by using forward and spot foreign exchange contracts. The Company can also be subject to short term exposure from exchange rate movements, for example, between the date when an investment is purchased or sold and the date when the settlement of the transaction occurs.

Other price risk

Other price risk arises mainly from uncertainty about future prices of financial instruments used in the Company's business. It represents the potential loss the Company might suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements.

The Board meets quarterly to consider the asset allocation of the portfolio and the risk associated with particular industry sectors within the parameters of the investment objective.

The Portfolio Manager is responsible for actively monitoring the existing portfolio selected in accordance with the overall asset allocation parameters described above and seeks to ensure that individual stocks meet an acceptable risk/reward profile. Other price risks arising from derivative positions, mainly due to the underlying exposures, are estimated using Value at Risk and Stress Tests as set out in the Company's internal Derivative Risk Measurement and Management Document.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulties in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Company's assets mainly comprise readily realisable securities and derivative instruments which can be sold easily to meet funding commitments if necessary. Short term flexibility is achieved by the use of a bank overdraft, if required.

Liquidity risk exposure

At 31 July 2018 the undiscounted gross cash outflows of the financial liabilities were all repayable within one year and consisted of derivative instrument liabilities of \$960,000 (2017: \$1,554,000) and other creditors of \$2,447,000 (2017: \$3,685,000).

Counterparty risk

Certain of the derivative instruments in which the Company may invest are not traded on an exchange but instead will be traded between counterparties based on contractual relationships, under the terms outlined in the International Swaps Dealers Association's ("ISDA") market standard derivative legal documentation. As a result the Company is subject to the risk that a counterparty may not perform its obligations under the related contract. In accordance with the risk management process which the Manager employs, the Manager will seek to minimise such risk by only entering into transactions with counterparties which are believed to have an adequate credit rating at the time the transaction is entered into, by ensuring that formal legal agreements covering the terms of the contract are entered into in advance, and through adopting a counterparty risk framework which measures, monitors and manages counterparty risk by the use of internal and external credit agency ratings and by evaluating derivative instrument credit risk exposure.

For Over The Counter ("OTC") derivative transactions, collateral is used to reduce the risk of both parties to the contract. Collateral is managed on a daily basis for all relevant transactions. At 31 July 2018, £457,000 (2017: £17,000) was held by the brokers in cash in a segregated collateral account on behalf of the Company, to reduce the credit risk exposure of the Company. This collateral comprised of: UBS AG £457,000 (2017: £17,000) held in cash denominated in US dollars. £2,363,000 (2017: £1,937,000), shown as amounts held at futures clearing houses and brokers on the Balance Sheet was held by the Company, in a segregated collateral account, on behalf of the brokers, to reduce the credit risk exposure of the brokers. This collateral is comprised of: HSBC Bank Plc £213,000 (2017: nil) in cash, Morgan Stanley & Co. International Plc £38,000 (2017: nil) in cash and UBS AG £2,112,000 (2017: £1,937,000) in cash.

Credit risk

Financial instruments may be adversely affected if any of the institutions with which money is deposited suffer insolvency or other financial difficulties. All transactions are carried out with brokers that have been approved by the Manager and are settled on a delivery versus payment basis. Limits are set on the amount that may be due from any one broker and are kept under review by the Manager. Exposure to credit risk arises on unsettled security transactions, derivative instrument contracts and cash at bank.

Derivative instruments risk

The risks and risk management processes which result from the use of derivative instruments are set out in a documented Derivative Risk Measurement and Management Document. Derivative instruments are used by the Manager for the following purposes:

- to gain unfunded long exposure to equity markets, sectors or single stocks. Unfunded exposure is exposure gained without an initial flow of capital;
- to hedge equity market risk using derivatives with the intention of at least partially mitigating losses in the exposures of the Company's portfolio as a result of falls in the equity market;
- to position short exposures in the Company's portfolio. These uncovered exposures benefit from falls in the prices of shares which the Portfolio Manager believes to be over valued. These positions, therefore, distinguish themselves from other short exposures held for hedging purposes since they are expected to add risk to the portfolio.

Interest rate risk sensitivity analysis


Based on the financial instruments held and interest rates at 31 July 2018, an increase of 0.25% in interest rates throughout the year would have increased the return on ordinary activities after taxation for the year and increased the net assets of the Company by £62,000 (2017: £70,000). A decrease of 0.25% in interest rates throughout the year would have had an equal but opposite effect.

Other price risk - exposure to investments sensitivity analysis

Based on the investments held and share prices at 31 July 2018, an increase of 10% in share prices, with all other variables held constant, would have increased the Company's net return on ordinary activities after taxation for the year and increased the net assets of the Company by £27,371,000 (2017: £26,408,000). A decrease of 10% in share prices would have had an equal and opposite effect.

Other price risk - net exposure to derivative instruments sensitivity analysis

Based on the derivative instruments held and share prices at 31 July 2018, an increase of 10% in the share prices underlying the derivative instruments, with all other variables held constant, would have decreased the Company's net return on ordinary activities after taxation for the year and decreased the net assets of the Company by £1,578,000 (2017: £2,077,000). A decrease of 10% in the share prices underlying the derivative instruments would have had an equal and opposite effect.

Fair Value of Financial Assets and Liabilities

Financial assets and liabilities are stated in the Balance Sheet at values which are not materially different to their fair values. As explained in Note 2 (k) and (l) above, investments and derivative instruments are shown at fair value. In the case of cash at bank, book value approximates to fair value due to the short maturity of the instruments.

Fair Value Hierarchy



American Depositary Receipt (ADR)

A negotiable certificate issued by a US bank representing a specified number of shares in a foreign stock that is traded on a US Exchange.

Capital Gains Tax (CGT)

The tax you may have to pay if you sell your shares at a profit.

Collateral

Assets provided as security.

Comparative Index

 $\operatorname{\mathsf{MSCI}}\nolimits$ All Countries Asia ex Japan Index (net) total return (in Sterling terms).

Contract for Difference (CFD)

A contract for difference is a derivative. It is a contract between the Company and an investment house at the end of which the parties exchange the difference between the opening price and the closing price of an underlying asset of the specified financial instrument. It does not involve the Company buying or selling the underlying asset, only agreeing to receive or pay the movement in its share price. A contract for difference allows the Company to gain access to the movement in the share price by depositing a small amount of cash known as margin. The Company may reason that the asset price will rise, by buying ("long" position) or fall, by selling ("short" position). If the Company holds long positions, dividends are received and interest is paid. If the Company holds short positions, dividends are paid and interest is received.

Corporation Tax

The UK tax the Company may have to pay on its profits for a year. As an investment trust company, the Company is exempt from UK corporation tax on its capital gains and does not pay tax on any UK dividends. It can also offset expenses against any taxable income and consequently it is tax efficient and does not pay corporation tax.

Custodian

An entity that holds (as intermediary) the Company's assets, arranges the settlement of transactions and administers income, proxy voting and corporate actions. The Company's Custodian is JPMorgan Chase Bank.

Depositary

An entity that oversees the custody, cash arrangements and other AIFM responsibilities of the Company. J.P.Morgan Europe Limited act as the Company's Depositary.

Derivatives

Financial instruments (such as futures, options and contracts for difference) whose value is derived from the value of an underlying asset.

Diluted Net Asset Value per Ordinary Share

The diluted net asset value per ordinary share reflects what the net asset value per ordinary share would have been if all the rights attached to the outstanding subscription shares had been exercised at the year end date. A dilution occurs when the exercise price of the subscription share rights is less than the net asset value per ordinary share.

Discount

If the share price of the Company is lower than the net asset value per ordinary share, the Company's shares are said to be trading at a discount. It is shown as a percentage of the net asset value per ordinary share. It is more common for an investment trust to trade at a discount than a premium.

Equity Linked Notes

Debt instruments whose return on investment is linked to specific equities or equity markets. The return on equity linked notes may be determined by an equity index, a basket of equities, or a single equity.

Fair Value

The fair value is the best measure of the realisable value of the investments, including derivatives, at a point in time and this is measured as:

- Listed investments valued at bid prices, or last market prices, as available, otherwise at published price quotations;
- **Unlisted investments** valued using an appropriate valuation technique in the absence of an active market;
- **Contracts for difference** valued as the difference between the settlement price of the contract and the underlying shares in the contract (unrealised gains or losses);
- Futures and options valued at the quoted trade price for the contract; and
- Forward currency contracts valued at the appropriate quoted forward foreign exchange rate ruling at the Balance Sheet date.

Forward Currency Contract

Agreement to buy or sell a currency at a specified future date and at a pre-agreed price.









Glossary of Terms continued

Futures

Agreements to buy or sell a stated amount of a security at a specific future date and at a pre-agreed price.

Gearina

Gearing describes the level of the Company's exposure and is expressed as a percentage of shareholders' funds. It reflects the amount of exposure the Company uses to invest in the market. It can be obtained through the use of bank loans, bank overdrafts and derivatives, in order to increase the Company's exposure to investments. If assets rise in value, gearing magnifies the return to shareholders. Correspondingly, if assets fall in value, gearing magnifies the fall. Derivatives are used as a way of gaining exposure to the price movements of shares without buying the underlying shares directly.

Gearing Percentage

In a simple example, if a company has £100 million of net assets and a total portfolio of £108 million, with £8 million of borrowings (either via bank loans or derivatives), then the shareholders' funds are 8% geared. Normally, the higher the gearing percentage, the more sensitive the Company's shares will be to the movements up and down in the value of the investment portfolio.

Gross Asset Exposure

A measure of the Company's total equity exposure. It is calculated as the sum of all long exposures, after taking account of hedging positions and the absolute value of all short exposures.

Hedging

A strategy aimed at minimising or eliminating the risk or loss through adverse movements normally involving taking a position in a derivative such as a future or an option.

FIL Investment Services (UK) Limited is the appointed Manager under the Alternative Investment Fund Managers' Directive ("AIFMD"), and has delegated the portfolio management of assets to FIL Investments International.

Net Asset Value (NAV)

Net asset value is sometimes also described as "shareholders' funds", and represents the total value of the Company's assets less the total value of its liabilities. For valuation purposes it is common to express the net asset value on a per ordinary share

Net Asset Value per Ordinary Share

The net asset value divided by the number of ordinary shares in issue.

Net Market Exposure

A measure of the Company's net equity exposure. It is calculated as the total of all long exposures (less the total of any exposures hedging the portfolio) less the total of all short exposures.

Ongoing Charges

Total operational expense (excluding finance costs and taxation) incurred by the Company as a percentage of average net asset values

Options

An option is a contract which gives the right but not the obligation to buy or sell an underlying asset at an agreed price on or before an agreed date. Options may be calls (buy) or puts (sell) and are used to gain or reduce exposure to the underlying asset on a conditional basis.

Portfolio Manager

Nitin Bajaj is the appointed Portfolio Manager of the Company and is responsible for managing the Company's assets.

Pre-emption Rights

Section 561 of the Companies Act 2006 provides that a company offering a new issue of shares must first make an offer of these shares, on the same or more favourable terms, in proportion to the nominal value held to existing shareholders. At each Annual General Meeting, the Board seeks shareholder approval to disapply pre-emption rights provision, up to 10% of the Company's issued share capital.

Premium

If the share price of the Company is higher than the net asset value per ordinary share, the Company's shares are said to be trading at a premium. The premium is shown as a percentage of the net asset value per ordinary share.

Registrar

An entity that manages the Company's shareholder register. The Company's Registrar is Link Asset Services.

Return

The return generated in a given period from investments:

- Revenue Return reflects the dividends and interest from investments and other income net of expenses, finance costs and taxation;
- Capital Return reflects the return on capital, excluding any revenue return; and
- Total Return reflects the aggregate of revenue and capital returns

Shareholders' Funds

Shareholders' funds are also described as net asset value and represent the total value of the Company's assets less the total value of its liabilities as shown in the balance sheet.

Total Return Performance

The return on the share price or net asset value per ordinary share taking into account the rise and fall of share prices and the dividends paid to shareholders. Any dividends received by the shareholder are assumed to have been reinvested for additional shares (for share price total return) or in the Company's assets (for net asset value total return).

Treasury Shares

Ordinary shares of the Company that have been repurchased by the Company and not cancelled but held in Treasury. These shares do not receive dividends, have no voting rights and are excluded from the net asset value per ordinary share calculation.

Alternative Investment Fund Manager's Disclosure
